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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.
- Mark schemes will indicate within the table where, and which strands of QWC, are being assessed. The strands are as follows:
 - (i) ensure that text is legible and that spelling, punctuation and grammar are accurate so that the meaning is clear
 - (ii) select and use a form and style of writing appropriate to purpose and to complex subject matter
 - (iii) organise information clearly and coherently, using specialist vocabulary when appropriate

1 (e)	A02 - 2 marks $148 \div 115 = 1.287$ (1) $1.287 \times 100 = 128.70$ (1)	Award 1 mark for correctly substituting numbers into formula. Award full marks for correct numerical answer without working.	(2)

Question Number	Explain one disadvantage of using questionnaires as a method of market research. Answer	Mark
1 (f)	A01 - 3 marks Award 1 mark for identification of a disadvantage of using a questionnaire, plus 2 further marks for explaining the reason, for a maximum of 3 marks. - If the questionnaire is too long (1) people may be reluctant to complete them (1) and may not give true answers (1) - If there are too many questions then people may not focus properly (1) and this could result in a low rate of return (1) therefore not giving the information required (1) NB No marks are awarded for a definition. Answers that list three disadvantages with no explanation will get a 1 mark only. Accept any other appropriate response.	(3)

Question Number	Analyse the benefits for <i>LEGO</i> of being a multinational business. Indicative content	Mark
1 (g)	AO2 = 3 marks AO3 = 3 marks <u>AO2</u> • <i>LEGO</i> can sell its Harry Potter toys around the world • The arts and craft materials can be produced in the most cost-effective location for <i>LEGO</i> <u>AO3</u> • This means that <i>LEGO</i>'s global market will increase compared to rivals • Thus reducing the average total cost and leading to a larger profit margin	(6)

2 (a)	A02 - 1 mark Award 1 mark for a financial objective in the context of the business. • <i>LEGO</i> wants to maintain its market share in the toy sector (1) • By achieving financial security, it allows <i>LEGO</i> to provide employment for its 18,000 employees (1) NB Do not accept if the objective is not in the context of <i>LEGO</i>. Accept any other appropriate response.	(1)

Question Number	State one reason why <i>LEGO</i> does not recruit casual employees. Answer	Mark
2 (b)	A02 - 1 mark Award 1 mark for a valid reason why <i>LEGO</i> do not employ casual employees in the context of the business. • Casual employees may not have the commitment to ensuring that the art materials they produce are of the high standard set by <i>LEGO</i> (1) • Casual employees may take longer to understand how the Harry Potter games are labelled and packed ready for despatch (1) NB Do not accept a reason that is not in the context of <i>LEGO</i>. Accept any other appropriate response.	(1)

Question Number	Explain one reason why a business would pay its employees above the minimum wage. Answer	Mark
2 (c)	A01 - 3 marks Award 1 mark why a business would pay its employees above the minimum wage, plus 2 further marks for explaining the reason, for a maximum of 3 marks. • Paying above the minimum wage will encourage more employees to work at a business (1) as they could be paid more than at a competitor (1) and they are likely to stay with the business because of the payment they receive (1) • Employees will feel more rewarded because of the pay they receive (1) and this could increase their motivation at work (1) and also improve their productivity (1) NB No marks are awarded for a definition. Answers that list three reasons why a business would pay above minimum wage with no explanation will get 1 mark only. Accept any other appropriate response.	(3)

Question Number	Explain one reason why product trials are important to a business. Answer	Mark
2 (d)	A01 - 3 marks Award 1 mark for a reason why product trials are important, plus 2 further marks for explaining this reason, for a maximum of 3 marks. • Gain customer feedback on a new product (1) identify strength/weaknesses/problems (1) which can then be addressed before the product enters the wider market (1) • By offering a customer a three month trial on electronic games (1) the customer can find out if they like the games (1) and if they do, they may purchase the game console (1) NB No marks are awarded for a definition. Answers that list three reasons with no explanation will get 1 mark only. Accept any other appropriate response.	(3)

Question Number	Explain one reason why a business complies with health and safety legislation. Answer	Mark
2 (e)	A01 - 3 marks Award 1 mark for identification why a business complies with health and safety legislation plus 2 further marks for explaining this reason, for a maximum of 3 marks. • If a business does not comply with the laws given by the country (1) they could be fined/sued if there was an accident or someone was injured (1) and the business could be fined/closed down for not complying with the legislation (1) • It ensures all staff are protected against injuries (1) meaning less days are lost to illness (1) and reducing the need to get in temporary cover saving costs (1) NB No marks are awarded for a definition. Answers that list three reasons with no explanation will get a 1 mark only. Accept any other appropriate response.	(3)

Question Number	Option 1: cost plus Option 2: skimming. Indicative content	Mark
2 (f)	A02 = 3 marks A03 = 3 marks A04 = 3 marks <u>A02</u> • Option 1 – This is easy to apply and <i>LEGO</i> will know that the cost of manufacturing the Princess Leia toy is covered when sold • Option 2 - This means that the new Princess Leia toy is sold at a high price when it is released <u>A03</u> • Option 1 – As each new toy is sold <i>LEGO</i> will know that it is making a profit on each sale • Option 2 - As each toy is sold it will have a high profit margin, if only a few toys are sold the profits would still be high because they know that as Star Wars toys are popular and will sell <u>A04</u> • Option 1 - However, even though this pricing strategy guarantees a profit, there is no guarantee that the toys will be sold as customer may wait until the price falls • Option 2 - However, this strategy might limit the number of potential customers wanting to buy the product as the price is too high. 3 (b)	A02 - 2 marks Award 1 mark for identifying a benefit for <i>LEGO</i> of being a family owned business, plus 1 further mark for linking it to the context of the question. This means that since 1932 the Kritiansen family have continuously run <i>LEGO</i> as a privately owned business (1) which gives <i>LEGO</i> stability and continuity (1) NB Do not accept a benefit that is not in the context of <i>LEGO</i> . Accept any other appropriate response.	(2)

3 (c)	A02 - 2 marks $150\,000 \times 0.045 = 6\,750$ (1) $150\,000 + 6\,750 =$ $156\,750$ (1) OR $150\,000 \times 1.045$ (1) $= 156\,750$ (1)	Award 1 mark for correctly substituting numbers into formula. Award full marks for correct numerical answer without working.	(2)

Question Number	Analyse how <i>LEGO</i> could use a Statement of Comprehensive Income when considering the development of new toys. Indicative content	Mark
3 (d)	A02 = 3 marks A03 = 3 marks <u>A02</u> • Statement of Comprehensive Income gathers data from all 15 worldwide <i>LEGO</i> factories • <i>LEGO</i> can use the information to see its financial position when introducing the new Star Wars Princess Leia toy and whether it has sufficient funds <u>A03</u> • This will enable <i>LEGO</i> to see if it is making a sufficient profit margin compared to other toy makers such as Disney allowing it to alter its pricing strategy • Introducing a new toy is expensive as there are costs of design and development as well as producing the toy before it goes on sale to the public	(6)

3 (e)	AO2 = 3 marks AO3 = 3 marks AO4 = 3 marks <u>AO2</u> • Option 1 – The cost of training is reduced as employees remain on the premises producing the Princess Leia toy whilst being trained • Option 2 – When employees are trained by experts off site, they gain new skills and see new production methods not seen in the 15 <i>LEGO</i> factories <u>AO3</u> • Option 1 – Employees gain in confidence as they are trained by staff they know whilst at <i>LEGO</i> • Option 2 – Employees can gain new skills from experts, resulting in fewer errors thus improving the number of toys produced in each factory <u>AO4</u> • Option 1 – However, this can be time consuming and prevents the skilled employees from carrying out their job efficiently • Option 2 – However, the new employees may not gain the specific skills and knowledge which are needed for designing the new Star Wars toys for <i>LEGO</i>	(9)

Question Number	Analyse the benefits to <i>LEGO</i> of increasing the use of robotics in the manufacture of toys and games. Indicative content	Mark
4 (b)	A02 – 3 marks A03 – 3 marks <u>A02</u> - Increasing the use of robotics reduces human error in the production of Princess Leia toys - Robotics increases the number of pineapple pencil holders that can be made <u>A03</u> - This means that there will be fewer toys rejected as there will be fewer faults in the manufacture of them - Production rate increases which reduces the manufacturing costs	(6)

4 (c)	AO1 = 3 marks AO2 = 3 marks AO3 = 3 marks AO4 = 3 marks <u>AO1</u> • Customers purchase <i>LEGO</i> toys and games because they are well known and have been trading for a long time • The toys made are of a good quality and should last for a long time <u>AO2</u> • <i>LEGO</i> has achieved 'Toy of the Century' twice meaning that people can rely on the products made • <i>LEGO</i> keeps up to date making toys to correspond to new films that are introduced such as Harry Potter <u>AO3</u> • As customers want to purchase toys and games that they know are reliable and well made • Fans of Harry Potter will want to purchase the new <i>LEGO</i> toys to play with <u>AO4</u> • However, there is no guarantee that customers will buy some of the products because they are expensive and may want a cheaper product • However, if the film is not a success, then the toys may not sell and <i>LEGO</i> will have wasted the time and investment in producing the toys	(12)
