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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

2ai	A linked description to include: One mark for a condition / process: • If a car/object/pedestrian is close (1) One mark for an output: • Actuator output (or result of): Applies the brakes / changes direction / vibrates the steering wheel • Audio/visual output: Sounds an alarm / Displays a warning NB: A mark should only be awarded for an output when it is linked to an appropriate condition. e.g. 'Notify the driver when it is time to refuel' would be awarded 0 marks. 4dii	A description to include two linked points: • Appropriate device (1) (e.g. microphone, braille keyboard, eye tracker) • An accessibility need that the device supports (1) • How the device supports the accessibility need (1) Examples of two-mark responses: • Users with limited mobility (MP2) can enter search terms with speech to text (MP3) • A braille keyboard (MP1) supports users with visual impairments (MP2) • An eye tracker (MP1) converts eye movements to key strokes (MP3) • Users with limited vision (MP2) can hear results through text to speech (MP3)	(2)
