4(c)(ii)	Income gearing has increased (1) significantly from 2016 because of extra interest payable on debentures. This is worse (1) for a shareholder. This will reduce profit available to equity holders and therefore also impact other investment ratios. (1) (Max 2) The gearing ratio has also increased (1) because of the debenture issue being a greater increase than the increase in retained earnings. (1) This increases the risk (1) of the company because of the need to pay interest and repay debt. (1) (Max 2) Dividend cover has stayed reasonably stable/increased (1) over the two years – as the profit available for distribution has decreased (1), so have the dividends. (Max 2) The price earnings ratio has decreased (1). This is also a reflection of the market price of a share and the risk attached to it, depending on the market confidence. (1) (Max 2)	8

(1) The company may be perceived as being less attractive to investors. (1) The company has had to pay additional finance costs. (1) This has reduced profits available to distribute to shareholders.
