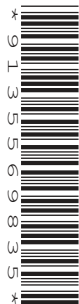

Answer questions from **two** different options.

Production, location and change

If answering this option, answer Question 1 and **either** Question 2 **or** Question 3.

- 1** Fig. 1.1 is a photograph which shows intensive food production on a farm in Thailand, an MIC in Asia.
- (a) Using evidence from Fig. 1.1, describe how technology is used to intensify food production. [4]
- (b) Explain **two** disadvantages of the intensification of agriculture. [6]
- 2** Assess the extent to which demand and distance from markets affect agricultural land use and practices on farms. [20]
- 3** 'The advantages of industrial agglomeration are greater than the disadvantages.'
- How far do you agree with this statement? [20]

Environmental management

If answering this option, answer Question 4 and **either** Question 5 **or** Question 6.

- 4** Fig. 4.1 shows electricity generated from solar power, by country, in 2022.
- (a) Describe the distribution of countries generating 10.1 TWh and above shown in Fig. 4.1. [4]
- (b) Explain **two** reasons for high rates of electrical energy production from renewable sources in some countries. [6]
- 5** Evaluate why fossil fuels continue to be important in the production of electrical energy for some countries. [20]
- 6** Assess the extent to which it is possible to provide safe and affordable drinking water for all people. [20]
