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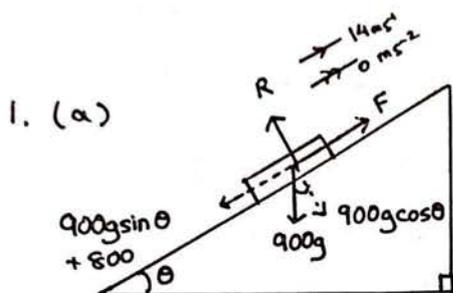
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1. A car of mass 900 kg is travelling up a straight road inclined at an angle θ to the horizontal, where $\sin \theta = \frac{1}{25}$. The car is travelling at a constant speed of 14 m s^{-1} and the resistance to motion from non-gravitational forces has a constant magnitude of 800 N. The car takes 10 seconds to travel from A to B , where A and B are two points on the road.

- (a) Find the work done by the engine of the car as the car travels from A to B . (4)

When the car is at B and travelling at a speed of 14 m s^{-1} the rate of working of the engine of the car is suddenly increased to $P \text{ kW}$, resulting in an initial acceleration of the car of 0.7 m s^{-2} . The resistance to motion from non-gravitational forces still has a constant magnitude of 800 N.

- (b) Find the value of P . (4)



$$R(\nearrow): F - 900g \sin \theta - 800 = 0$$

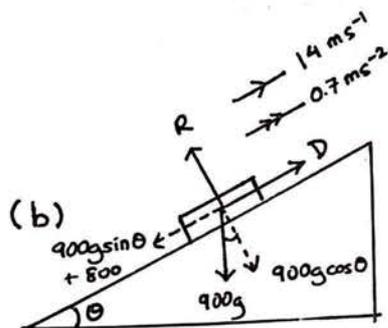
$$F = 900(9.8)\left(\frac{1}{25}\right) + 800 = 1152.8 \text{ N}$$

$$\text{speed} = \frac{\text{distance}}{\text{time taken}}$$

$$14 = \frac{\text{distance}}{10}$$

$$\text{distance} = 140 \text{ m}$$

$$\begin{aligned} \text{Work done by the engine} &= 1152.8 \times 140 \\ &= 161392 \\ &\approx 160000 \text{ J (2 SF)} \end{aligned}$$



$$R(\nearrow): D - 900g \sin \theta - 800 = 900(0.7)$$

$$D = 900(9.8)\left(\frac{1}{25}\right) + 800 + 630$$

$$D = 1782.8 \text{ N}$$

$$\begin{aligned} P &= Dv \\ &= 1782.8 \times 14 \\ &= 24959.2 \\ &\approx 25 \text{ kW (2 SF)} \end{aligned}$$

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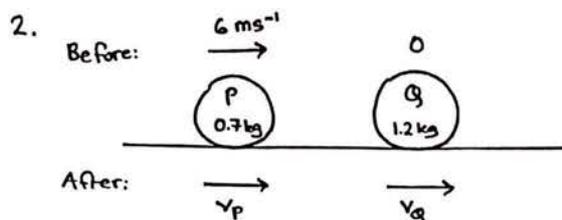
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2. A particle P of mass 0.7 kg is moving in a straight line on a smooth horizontal surface. The particle P collides with a particle Q of mass 1.2 kg which is at rest on the surface. Immediately before the collision the speed of P is 6 m s^{-1} . Immediately after the collision both particles are moving in the same direction. The coefficient of restitution between the particles is e .

(a) Show that $e < \frac{7}{12}$ (7)

Given that $e = \frac{1}{4}$

(b) find the magnitude of the impulse exerted on Q in the collision. (3)



(a) PCLM (\rightarrow):

$$(0.7) + 0(1.2) = 0.7v_p + 1.2v_q$$

$$4.2 = 0.7v_p + 1.2v_q$$

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3. At time t seconds ($t \geq 0$) a particle P has velocity $v \text{ m s}^{-1}$, where

$$\mathbf{v} = (6t^2 + 6t)\mathbf{i} + (3t^2 + 24)\mathbf{j}$$

When $t = 0$ the particle P is at the origin O . At time T seconds, P is at the point A and $\mathbf{v} = \lambda(\mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j})$, where λ is a constant.

Find

- (a) the value of T , (3)
- (b) the acceleration of P as it passes through the point A , (3)
- (c) the distance OA . (5)

(a) At T s,

$$\mathbf{x} = \lambda(\mathbf{i} + \mathbf{j})$$

$$(6t^2 + 6t)\mathbf{i} + (3t^2 + 24)\mathbf{j} = \lambda\mathbf{i} + \lambda\mathbf{j}$$

Comparing \mathbf{i} :

$$6t^2 + 6t = \lambda$$

Comparing \mathbf{j} :

$$3t^2 + 24 = \lambda$$

$$\therefore 6t^2 + 6t = 3t^2 + 24$$

$$3t^2 + 6t - 24 = 0$$

$$t^2 + 2t - 8 = 0$$

$$t^2 + 4t - 2t - 8 = 0$$

$$t(t+4) - 2(t+4) = 0$$

$$(t-2)(t+4) = 0$$

$$\therefore T = 2 \text{ or } T = -4$$

$$\therefore T = 2 \text{ [}\because t \geq 0\text{]}$$

(b) $\mathbf{a} = \frac{d\mathbf{v}}{dt} = (12t+6)\mathbf{i} + 6t\mathbf{j} \text{ m s}^{-2}$

when $t=2$,

$$\mathbf{a} = (12(2)+6)\mathbf{i} + 6(2)\mathbf{j}$$

$$\therefore \mathbf{a} = 30\mathbf{i} + 12\mathbf{j} \text{ m s}^{-2}$$

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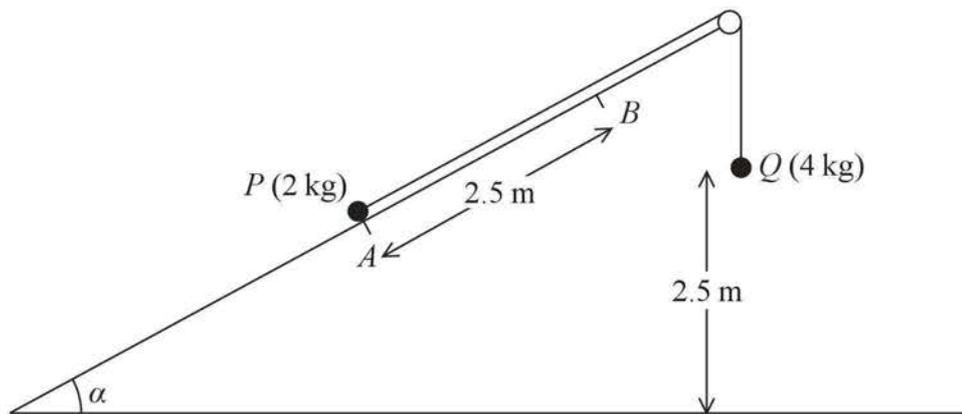

Two particles P and Q , of mass 2 kg and 4 kg respectively, are connected by a light inextensible string. Initially P is held at rest at the point A on a rough fixed plane inclined

at α to the horizontal ground, where $\sin \alpha = \frac{3}{5}$. The string passes over a small smooth

pulley fixed at the top of the plane. The particle Q hangs freely below the pulley and 2.5 m above the ground, as shown in Figure 1. The part of the string from P to the pulley lies along a line of greatest slope of the plane. The system is released from rest with the string taut. At the instant when Q hits the ground, P is at the point B on the plane. The coefficient of friction between P and the plane is $\frac{1}{4}$.

- (a) Find the work done against friction as P moves from A to B . (4)
- (b) Find the total potential energy lost by the system as P moves from A to B . (3)
- (c) Find, using the work-energy principle, the speed of P as it passes through B . (4)

(a) $R(\perp)$: $R = 2g \cos \alpha$
 $= 2g \left(\frac{4}{5}\right)$
 $R = \frac{8g}{5} \text{ N}$

$F = \mu R$
 $= \frac{1}{4} \times \frac{8g}{5}$

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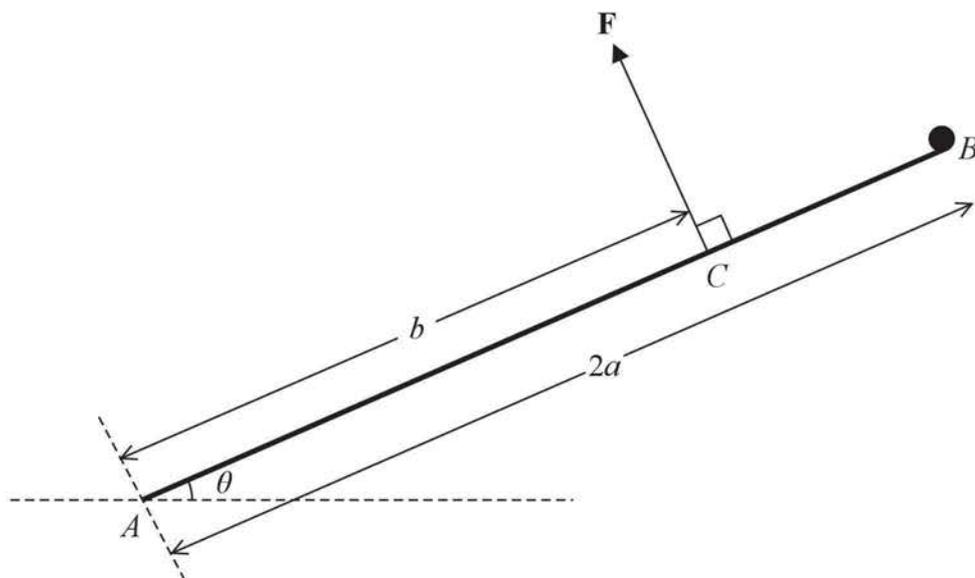

A uniform rod AB , of mass $3m$ and length $2a$, is freely hinged at A to a fixed point on horizontal ground. A particle of mass m is attached to the rod at the end B . The system is held in equilibrium by a force \mathbf{F} acting at the point C , where $AC = b$. The rod makes an acute angle θ with the ground, as shown in Figure 3. The line of action of \mathbf{F} is perpendicular to the rod and in the same vertical plane as the rod.

- (a) Show that the magnitude of \mathbf{F} is $\frac{5mga}{b} \cos \theta$ (4)

The force exerted on the rod by the hinge at A is \mathbf{R} , which acts upwards at an angle ϕ above the horizontal, where $\phi > \theta$.

- (b) Find
- (i) the component of \mathbf{R} parallel to the rod, in terms of m , g and θ ,
 - (ii) the component of \mathbf{R} perpendicular to the rod, in terms of a , b , m , g and θ . (5)
- (c) Hence, or otherwise, find the range of possible values of b , giving your answer in terms of a . (2)

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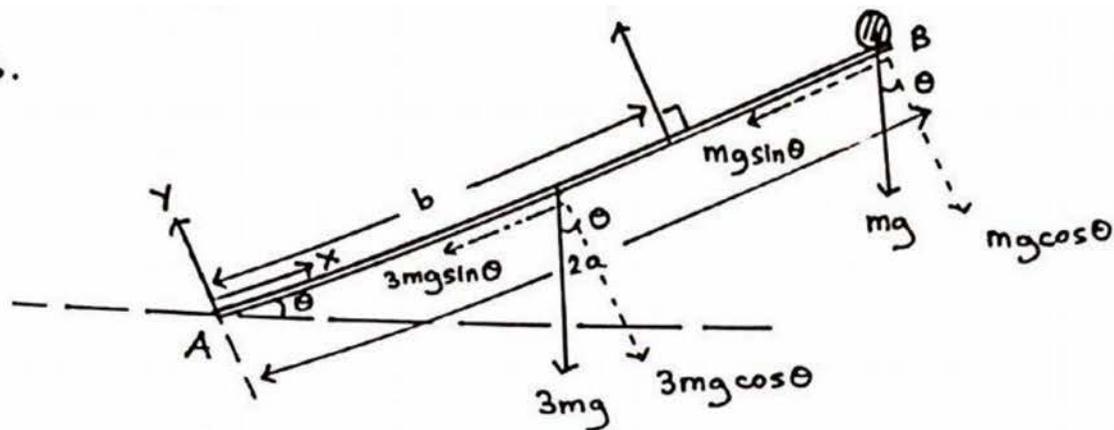

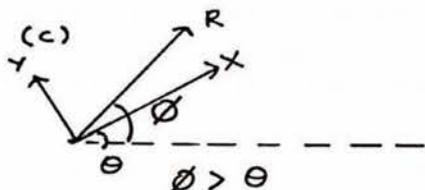

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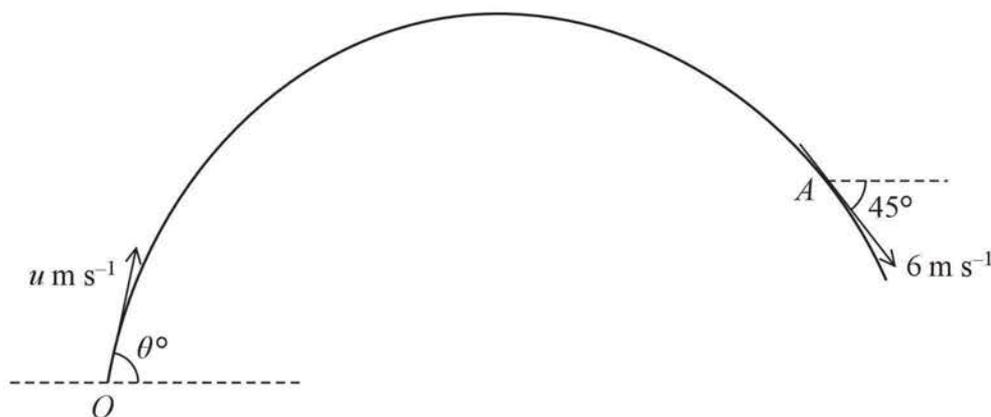

At time $t = 0$, a particle P of mass 0.7 kg is projected with speed $u \text{ m s}^{-1}$ from a fixed point O at an angle θ° to the horizontal. The particle moves freely under gravity. At time $t = 2$ seconds, P passes through the point A with speed 6 m s^{-1} and is moving downwards at 45° to the horizontal, as shown in Figure 4.

Find

(a) the value of θ , (6)

(b) the kinetic energy of P as it reaches the highest point of its path. (3)

For an interval of T seconds, the speed, $v \text{ m s}^{-1}$, of P is such that $v \leq 6$

(c) Find the value of T . (5)

(a) Horizontal velocity is constant $\Leftrightarrow u \cos \theta = 6 \cos 45^\circ$

$$u = \frac{6 \cos 45^\circ}{\cos \theta}$$

$$\begin{aligned} R(\uparrow): \quad s &= \\ u &= u \sin \theta \\ v &= -6 \sin 45^\circ \\ a &= -g \\ t &= 2 \end{aligned}$$

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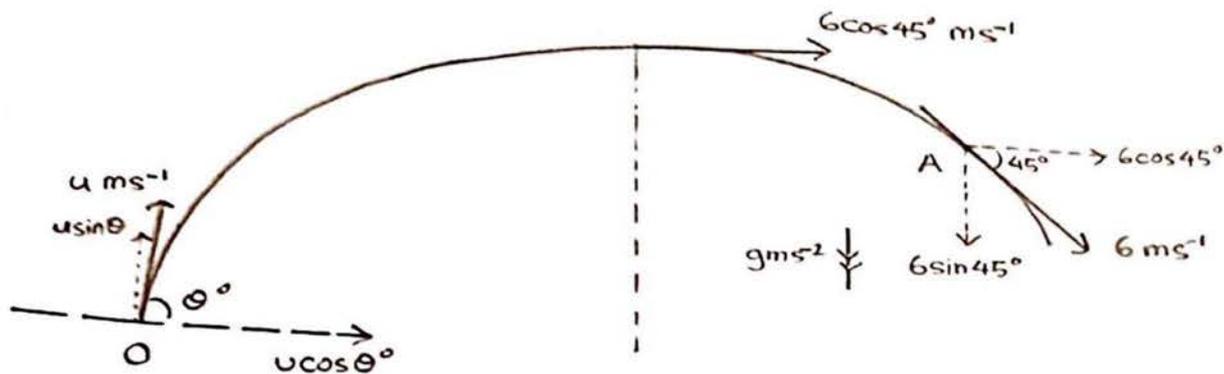
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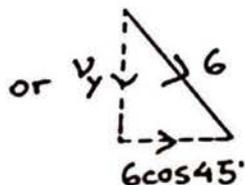
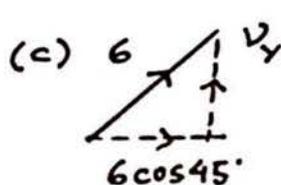
