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General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

(ii)	Two from - takes time for bacteria to travel through the gut; - bacteria have an incubation period/need time to multiply; - certain level of bacteria/bacterial toxin needed (before symptoms show);		(2)

10 (b) (i)	- S appropriate scale chosen; - L axes labelled appropriately with correct units; - A axes correct way round, i.e. year on the X axis; - P points plotted correctly; - S suitable line through points/bar chart;		(5)
(ii)	For Salmonella only: - statement true for food poisoning from salmonella; - data to support above statement, e.g. gone down each year apart from 2005 – 2007/from 31 to 9; For all bacteria: - statement mainly true/not entirely true for total no of food poisoning cases from all bacteria; - data to support statement, e.g. fallen from 94 (in 1997) to 70 (in 2005) / fell until 2005, but rose again in 2007 to 2009;	Allow salmonella only decreased Allow all bacteria decreased and then increased	(4)

(ii)	• stops blood flow/person losing too much blood; • stops pathogens/bacteria/disease-causing organisms entering;	Allow reduces risk of infection Reject: stops disease (entering)	(2)
(b) (i)	• male; • normal blood clotting; • X^hY; • X^hX^h;	Do not accept normal Allow reversal of chromosomes i.e. YX^h	(4)
(ii)	• females produced can only be X^HX^h or X^HX^H; • if child who has haemophilia is female they must have X^hX^h; • but man whose blood clots normally must have X^H allele/does not carry recessive allele; • father cannot pass on X^h to child/mother passes X^h to child;	Do not allow Punnett square or genetic diagram	(3)
